NAIDOC DAY




ATTENDANCE

It was lovely to see so many community members who stayed throughout the day to spend time with their children participating in the activities.


















































Pescriptive language about a character by 5 Kangaroo Paw!

A summary of what Kim told us.


- Cathy freeman was her idol. Kim thought Cathy was lucky to be fast.

A very clear message is illustrated through her story if you keep on trying and work hard one day you just might reach that goal you are working towards.


